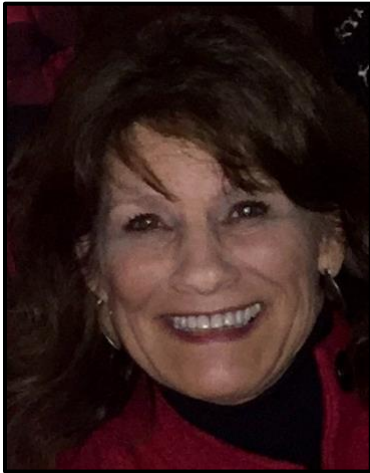

He has served two full terms on the Grace Vestry (2010-2012 and 2020-2022) and served one year (2016) to finish out an unexpired term. He has been actively involved in Grace Church's adult formation program, has chaired the church's Outreach Committee, and has been a Vestry co-chair of the Administration Committee. He has served as Junior Warden (2021) and Senior Warden (2022). He also served three years on the Grace Stewardship Education Committee. Jane Schronce, a member of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Lincolnton for more than forty years, Jane has been active in the diocese as a member of Executive Council, a discernment consultant, and as a member of a variety of committees such as Strategic Planning, Mission and Structure, Diocesan Dreaming, Congregational Vitality, and Funding and Function. She served on the Transition Committees for Bishop Taylor as well as Bishop José. Jane has served several terms on the Lake Logan Board of Directors.

The Rev. Susan Buchanan has served as Rector of St. James in Lenoir since August 2017. She brings 28 years of parish ministry experience in three different dioceses. As a member of the Diocese of Western North Carolina since 2017, she has served a term on the Executive Council and as a Clergy Deputy to General Convention. She believes that she would bring a good background of diverse experience to the work of the Standing Committee. She graduated from Virginia Seminary in 1994. Along with her work here, she also served three terms as a Deputy to General Convention from New Hampshire. She has served on the Commission on Ministry (NH), the Parish Youth Ministries program (VA), UTO Grant Committee (VA), and was appointed to the

Constitution and Canons Committee (VA). She served the Diocese of VA as the director of the summer seminarian training program, and also was chaplain for one week each summer at the diocesan camp. Alongside her parish work in NH she also worked in the local hospital for 11 years as chaplain in an Alzheimer's care unit. In Lenoir she has been a leader in working for racial reconciliation, working with lay leadership building bridges between historically black churches and the congregation at St. James. Besides working to build personal relationships, St. James has provided support and opportunity for almost 100 residents of Lenoir (from 7 different churches) to take the Sacred Ground course. She and one of the lay leaders were recognized for this work by the local NAACP at the Martin Luther King celebration in 2022.



The Rev. Elizabeth Roles is the 12th rector of St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Brevard. She delights in the shared life of the church community in good times and hard times, playing, celebrating, making decisions together, serving, and sometimes facing conflict. And in this common life, together being transformed more and more into the likeness of Christ. Nominees for Deputy to General Convention 2024 – Clergy Position

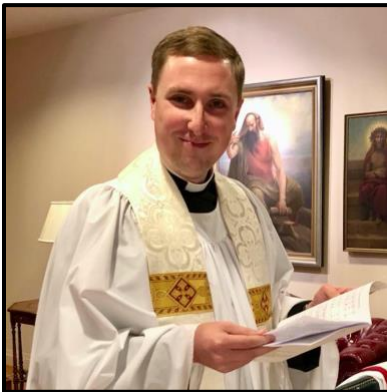

She serves on the Executive Council for the Diocese of Western North Carolina for the Western Deanery. Prior to the priesthood Gaelyn was a Nationally Board Certified public school teacher. She is a proud alum of Haywood Community College (A.A.S. Horticulture), the University of North Carolina at Asheville (B.A. Sociology with K-6 licensure), and Virginia Theological Seminary (M.Div.) Her thesis: Planning the Proclamation: Increasing Scriptural Literacy Through Preaching combined her specialty in curriculum writing from

her years of teaching with homiletics. Gaelyn is an Associate for the Order of St. Helena, a Monastic Community for Women in the Episcopal Church and is passionate about how the language we use for God and humanity impacts our view and understanding of both. She has been diligent about introducing and praying the proposed trial liturgies (Eucharistic Prayers A, B, and D expansive language 2018 revisions) with her congregation believing that we can only make decisions about prayers and possible prayer book revision if we have faithfully prayed what is proposed. Gaelyn is also on staff for the Wild Goose Festival where she handles administration, finance, and worship and is part of the team who visions and dreams each festival into reality.



The Rev. Dr. Marshall A. Jolly serves as rector of Grace Episcopal Church in Morganton. In the wider church and community, he serves as volunteer chaplain at UNC Health Blue Ridge Hospital, as board secretary of the Valle Crucis Conference Center, as a member of the North Carolina Supreme Court's Faith & Justice Alliance Steering Committee, as a member of the Standing Committee in the Diocese of Western North Carolina, and he has also served as a Deputy or Alternate Deputy to the 78th, 79th, and 80th General Conventions of the Episcopal Church.



The Rev. Deacon Kristi Neal (she/her/hers) grew up in Marion, North Carolina. Kristi was confirmed at St. Luke's Boone in 1996 after growing up in the Presbyterian Church. She was ordained to the diaconate in 2006 and after a year at St. Luke's Asheville, she has served at St. James, Black Mountain. She was honored to serve as the Archdeacon of the Diocese of WNC from 2011-2019. She was recognized by the Association of Episcopal Deacons in the tradition of St. Stephen in 2019 and received the Bishop's award at Diocesan Convention the same year. She was a mentor to deacons around the country for the Seminary of the Southwest continuing education program from 2019-2022. Kristi has served on the Commission on Ministry, the Human, Hurt and Hope committee, and three times as deputy to the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. She has served on the Environmental

Stewardship and Care of Creation Committee for General Convention since 2014. Kristi's diaconal ministry is in advocacy primarily for children and public education. She mentored a Sacred Ground group at St. James in the spring of 2022 and is an advocate for this program which fills in the gaps of the United States History taught in public schools. Sacred Ground also makes participants go deep into their own hearts to do the inner work around racism.



The Rev. Dr. Scott White is the Rector of Trinity Church in Asheville. He attended the General Theological Seminary in New York, where he earned his Master of Divinity, and the Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria, where he earned a Doctor of Ministry in Ministry and Congregational Development. Scott has served in congregations both small and large, all urban, some rural, in the Diocese of North Carolina. He served on Diocesan Council, the Bishop's Pastoral Response team, and several other Diocesan roles there. Scott is familiar with and fascinated by the changing dynamics of the church and has led workshops in appreciative leadership, shepherding both congregations and clergy navigating the terrain of church development in uncertain times. During COVID, he became credentialed in coaching and partners with communities and clergy trying to figure church out in

a sometimes confusing world. Scott was deeply involved in building ecumenical and cross-congregational relationships with communities of color in Eastern North Carolina. He has helped create a collaborative of churches and clergy in downtown Asheville where congregations work together to address homelessness, hunger, and exclusion. Scott serves as Conference Leader of CREDO, a program of the Church Pension Fund where the fund provides the clergy of the church time away to examine the core areas of their life and ministry, including Spirituality, Finances, Health, and Vocation. Scott served as a Deputy to the 2022 General Convention on behalf of our diocese. He would be honored to do so again in the upcoming convention in 2024.
